### **ESIG Service and My Recovery**

My name is Steve and I am an alcoholic.

I was very fortunate when I came into the rooms of AA that my first sponsor stressed the importance of Service from the beginning. He "volunteered" me for the chair stacker service position at my home group even before we read "We Agnostics" in the Big Book. I wasn't too thrilled being "volunteered" but he reminded me I had agreed to "go to any length to get it."

I started to notice the benefits of Service right away. I was a classic "avoider", so for me the idea of making a commitment and sticking to it was uncharted territory. Somehow taking on that first service position helped me feel "part of" the home group. And at the end of the night I felt good about myself for being a contributor. Go figure.

At about 9-months sober my home group's ESIG Rep resigned. My Sponsor once again "volunteered" me for the position. I said "Sure. Sounds great. What is the Intergroup?" He told me all I needed to do was attend the monthly ESIG meetings and give a report at the Home Group business meetings. Little did I know that becoming the ESIG Rep would change my whole concept of service.

Before my first ESIG monthly meeting I went to the Intergroup office to introduce myself and pick up a new rep packet. (As some of you might recall, the old Intergroup office was in the basement of a strip mall near Crossroads Mall.) When I made my first visit I noticed cans of paint were stacked up along the wall. As luck would have it, they were getting ready to paint the office, and they asked if I would be interested in joining the painting crew.

That was music to my ears. I loved to paint! Getting the opportunity to be part of a painting crew is exactly what this loner-alcoholic needed at that point in my recovery. It gave me something to do and it was a great opportunity to meet new people.

The painting crew was a mixture of old-timers and new-comers, men and women, just like AA as a whole. I loved getting to know new people. The painting crew conversations we had were completely different from either Sponsor-Sponsee conversations, or from sharing at meetings. They were much more casual, relaxed, and thought provoking. I was able to ask questions that helped me gain new perspectives on the purpose of the inventory process, the reasons making amends and forgiveness are so important, and how Steps 6 & 7 are the "change" steps. I loved it!


Through ESIG Service I was able to get involved in a couple of other AA projects which allowed me to meet some other unique people.

One interesting fellow was an atheist – which was the polar opposite of my Sponsor who was all about "God, God," Before talking with this fellow I simply couldn't understand how an atheist could have a "spiritual awakening" without the underlying notion of God. He was gracious enough to take the time to help me understand his perspective on the meaning of a spiritual awakening, and surprisingly I came to understand his point of view. (Not necessarily *agree*, but *understand*.) Now I have come to view AA's original atheist Jimmy Burwell, who insisted we include the simple words "God *as we understood him*" in the Steps, is my spiritual hero. (This reminds me of the Herbert Spencer quote in Appendix II: I was guilty of "contempt prior to investigation.")

The payback from service has been enormous for me. Accepting responsibility and meeting commitments helped build my self-esteem when I needed it the most. Working with others (even on a painting crew) provided me with immediate satisfaction for a job well done. And the camaraderie of working on a team helped me build long term friendships that still last today.

# From the Spiral #15

The following are just a few one-liners from our fellowship to help us stay close to our program in addition to some commentary about the quote.

1. When I do something I intuitively don't want to do, I end up getting the most growth.

I remember that my stubbornness and skepticism still clung to me during my first months of sobriety. My sponsor made many suggestions to me that I had reservations about. As I have said before, I was also suggested to "do it anyway." Once I did, the growth began. I still need to be mindful of my brain telling me what it doesn't want to do. The louder that stubbornness gets, the more I know that I need to do the opposite in order to continue growing in my recovery.

2. Don't worry about the future because it's going to be different when you get there anyway.

Despite my best intentions, I cannot predict the future, but I spend a lot of time and energy worrying about it and trying to control it. When my head is in tomorrow, I am not in gratitude. For me, the opposite of gratitude is resentment. I cannot be present if I am future tripping. When I am present, I am grateful. In that mode, I am the most at peace and useful to others.

3. You cannot stay sober alone.

I have always wanted to do things myself. I did this so I would get to take credit for how awesome I am. The truth is that I tried to stay sober all by myself and that never lasted. This tells me that this design for living cannot be accomplished independently, and that is the point. Part of my surrender to alcohol was admitting that I needed help, which was a huge step in beginning a new way of behaving. So far, life has never been better, even when things get hard. When a challenge presents itself, I ask myself, "How would my sponsor handle this?" or "What would my higher power have me do?" Usually, this is all the help I need. When that is not enough, I pause, pray, and call my sponsor. I used to automatically react by trying to figure it all out alone. Because I have transformed, thanks to the program of Alcoholics Anonymous, I intuitively know how to proceed. The evidence exists at the meetings that we succeed together. Find people who have what you want, do what is suggested, and you will never be alone again.

I hope this helps, and I'll see you at a meeting.

# **Information Corner**

### **Step 10**

"Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it."

"When a drunk has a terrific hangover because he drank heavily yesterday, he cannot live well today. But there is another kind of hangover which we all experience whether we are drinking or not. That is the emotional hangover, the direct result of yesterday's and sometimes today's excesses of negative emotion – anger, fear, jealousy, and the like. If we would live serenely today and tomorrow, we certainly need to eliminated these hangovers. This doesn't mean we need to wander morbidly around in the past. It requires an admission and correction of errors now. Our inventory enables us to settle with the past. When this is done, we are really able do leave it behind us. When our inventory is carefully taken, and we have made peace with ourselves, the conviction follows that tomorrow's challenges can be met as they come." (Twelve Steps and *Twelve Traditions*, pg. 88-89)

"This thought brings us to *Step Ten*, which suggests we continue to take personal inventory and continue to set right any new mistakes as we go along. We vigorously commenced this way of living as we cleaned up the past. We have entered the world of the Spirit. Our next function is to grow in understanding and effectiveness. This is not an overnight matter. It should continue for our lifetime. Continue to watch for self-ishness, dishonesty, resentment, and fear. When these crop up, we ask God at once to remove them. We discuss them with someone immediately and make amends quickly if we have harmed anyone. Then we resolutely turn our thoughts to someone we can help. Love and tolerance of others is our code." (*Alcoholics Anonymous*, pg. 84)

### **Tradition 10**

"Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy."

"On the other side of the world, millions have died even recently in religious dissension. Other millions have died in political controversy. The end is not yet. Nearly everybody in the world has turned reformer. Each group, society, and nation is saying to the other, "You must do as we say, or else." Political controversy and reform by compulsion have reached an all-time high. And eternal, seemingly, are the flames of religious dissension.

Being like other men and women, how can we expect to remain forever immune from these perils? Probably we shall not. At length, we must meet them all. We cannot flee from them, nor ought we try. If these challenges do come, we shall, I am sure, go out to meet them gladly and unafraid. That will be the acid test of our worth.

Our best defense? This surely lies in the formation of a Tradition respecting serious controversy so powerful that neither the weakness of persons nor the strain and strife of our troubled times can harm Alcoholics Anonymous. We know that AA must continue to live, or else many of us and many of our fellow alcoholics throughout the world will surely resume the hopeless journey to oblivion. That must never be.

As though by some deep and compelling instinct, we have thus far avoided serious controversies. Save minor and healthy growing pains, we are at peace among ourselves. And because we have thus far adhered to our sole aim, the whole world regards us favorably.

May God grant us the wisdom and fortitude ever to sustain an unbreakable unity."



# And Finally...

## ... from the Publisher

October usually means discussions on Step 10 in meetings. Really, I do not like having to apologize for my mistakes. At all. Yet I do make mistakes. Often. Which means I get to live this step constantly. Good thing for me, because there is so much greatness in the literature about this step. One of my favorites is on Page 90 of the 12 & 12: "It is a spiritual axiom that every time we are disturbed, no matter what the cause, there is something wrong with us." Since I'm frequently disturbed, I need to work really hard on restraint of pen and tongue, and to practice the Step 10 principles on Page 84 of the Big Book: continuing to watch for selfishness, dishonesty, resentment, and fear. Asking God at once to remove them, discussing them with someone immediately, then turning my thoughts to someone I might be able to help. Finally, make love and tolerance my code. Whoa. If I have to do all that work to make an amends, perhaps the easier, softer way is to be accepting, tolerant, and kind from the outset! Easy to say, yet this is one of the times where my recovery is sometimes slowly, in the glacial sense of the word. And with a sponsor, a group of fellow A.A.s I am in contact with regularly, service, and working with others, progress is made. For me, a good dose of gratitude while I'm pausing can put my ego back in check.

The Eastside?

As life would have it, I was laid off at the burst of the dot com bubble. Since A.A. had worked wonders in my life, it would do so again, and I was out of work a very short time. Part of the career move meant taking a position in the Redmond area. Being newly single meant I had an opportunity to move closer to work, and seemed the logical next move after I crashed on an A.A. friend's couch fleeing my most recent relationship failure. Living on the Eastside also uprooted me from my Seattle sober buddies, and finding new roots was bittersweet. I had no idea how much I would miss being away until much later when I was sitting in my new home group Serenity Break with my sponsor and realizing I had only that connection. So I made the attempt to attend more meetings and dig into service in this part of the world, which really paid off with wonderful friendships and the love A.A. is known for everywhere.
