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


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A Very Special Amends in My Life

When I got sober, I blamed my alcoholism and all my problems on my family, especially my parents. I left home at 17 and would say that I never looked back, but I did show up for Mother's Day, Father's Day, Christmas and all those things that for some reason still thought I would get in trouble for not attending.

I was 33 when I got sober, had been married to the same guy for 15 years and had two kids ages 4 and 8, had home, 2 cars and a good job. I immersed myself in AA and when my older son was 12 I had him babysitting the younger one so that I could go to more AA meetings. I thought I was doing the right thing, working on myself, and staying sober.

What I missed though was that my older son had already started drinking and using drugs at age 12 and I was leaving him in charge of my younger son. I missed the signs and even when I saw some of them, I ignored them because he would say I was always picking on him. I thought I was helping our family be being in AA so much.

What I later learned is that I was running away from everything and not taking care of what was right in front of me. By age 14 he had a lengthy juvenile record including stealing a car. He had stolen from us on more than one occasion, and we were constantly meeting with a probation officer.

One Christmas when he was about 15, my younger brother's family said they would prefer my son either didn't come to their home for Christmas or that he sat with the adults and not be allowed to join the other kids or be out of the sight of adults. I was appalled that they would look at my family like that.

Looking back, my brother and his wife raised a faith-based family, and their children were what I call normal and stable because of good parenting. Me? I had a 15-year-old addict/alcoholic that would soon be using heroin and I stood on my high horse and judged them.

My brother and I were only a year apart in age and we were close when we were young. But the difference between our families was glaring even though I didn't see it until many years later. We would see each other at family events but that was it.

Several years ago, my brother was diagnosed with ALS and I was so angry at God for letting all this time pass without the closeness of our younger days. I was mad at God for giving him this horrible death sentence. But my brother asked our family to not be angry at God and to know he felt there was some reason for all of this.

I prayed for what to do with these missed years between us. I called him and told him that I really wanted to get to know him before he died. That was probably the hardest call I've ever made. We met my brother and his wife for dinner and laughed about old times and talked about the future.

It's only because of this program that I was able to make that call to him and then follow through and continue to show up in his life as a loving sister until the day he died. I'd see him as often as I could and when he'd be a smart ass, I would threaten to wheel him into the pool. A week before his passing he showed me all his different hiking pictures and adventures. My brother and his wife not only went through this disease with grace, but my brother died with dignity and grace. When he passed, he knew I loved him, and I knew he loved me.

I miss him a lot but feel his smile and kind eyes often. Thank God for this program and the ability to set things right. His wife and I continue our journey as sisters.

The following are just a few one-liners from our fellowship to help us stay close to our program in addition to some commentary about the quote.

Reading doesn't get you there; practicing what's in the reading gets you there

I love how hearing other people's suggestions in the program are not sugarcoated because that engages my attention just when I think that I got my message for the day. Reading is something I struggle with in that I am highly selective. Reading just for the sake of reading isn't my thing. My thing is living. I would rather experience a sunset than read about one. This line reminds me that our literature isn't a collection of novels. The literature is a series of workbooks, and all workbooks have the most effectiveness when they are taught by an instructor, or a Sponsor. Having a guide and translator is a gift you cannot put a price on, but to see that guide practice the principles outside of the rooms has been the greatest teacher for me.

2. When I'm suffering, my mind is on me

Of all the rabbit holes we spend our time in whether it's social media, conspiracy theories, or an idea for a business, the mind is the easiest trap to fall into and the hardest one from which to escape. In my experience, I escape into my mind, usually without even realizing it. For this alcoholic, I escape because it is a coping mechanism triggered by discomfort or frustration from my inability to control a person, place, or thing. Usually, I spin around in my head because I need a solution, or answer to a question. Before I know it, a ton of time has gone by that I'll never get back, and I am angrier than I was when I began. The 12 X 12 tells us that "when I am disturbed, there is something wrong with me." The member who quoted this at my home group the other night put his own spin on it by suggesting that when he suffers, his mind is on him. The only way out is to take action with someone who isn't you. Literally shift your time, energy, and focus on to someone else. When you make this shift, you will then experience the relief and serenity you were seeking in the first place.

3. Sunlight is the best disinfectant

The first I heard this I was confused because I thought the person sharing was talking out stain removal. Yes, I write for the newsletter and even I find my mind drifting during a meeting sometimes. I asked my Sponsor about this line later on and he told me that the meaning of it is to be honest. Once again, I love how our members word things in a way that I find intriguing and approachable. As I kid, I was sternly told to tell the truth or I was going to hell. It should come as no surprise to you that such a notion only scared me into lying even more to keep my secrets protected. The community of Alcoholics Anonymous welcomes honesty and rewards you for it. As you work the steps, you will find power and serenity in shedding light on your secret thoughts, feelings, or supposed sins. Ask any of our members who have completed a 4th and 5th Step if they felt worse after Step 5 then when they handed their 4th Step over to their Sponsor.

I hope this helps, and I'll see you at a meeting.

STORE/OFFICE ACTIVITY:

For the past few years, we've developed a relationship with Eastside Fire and Rescue and their team of care advocates. When they encounter someone that is a frequent 911 caller and it is related to alcoholism, they contact us for help. They always get consent from the person before contacting us and it's been a good relationship. Together, we've helped a lot of people.

In May we had 2 more calls, one for a man and one for a woman. We were able to connect them with people, but we almost always end up calling the same people to help. This month, thank you again Dan H. in Issaquah and Wendy J. in Duvall.

We sent out an email earlier in the month asking our Reps to check with their groups to see if anyone would be interested in taking these referral calls and we didn't get very many responses. 
